A friend approached me the other day and asked, "between Dan Maes and Tom Tancredo, who do you think would be a better Governor?" He asked me in a way that made it obvious he is considering both and wanted my opinion on which one has more experience, in traditional political terms. I responded with, "it doesn't matter, Tom isn't an option." This began the same debate and the same question being asked by many folks in the conservative and liberty movements. Based on voter registration and current polling, what Tom Tancredo is doing will split the vote enough to insure a victory for Hickenlooper should he pursue his misguided campaign. The issue isn't what a nice guy Tom is, or how popular he has been, or how qualified he is to be governor. To folks like me in the Liberty Movement, it's the realization that something has gone terribly wrong in our political system. The core values that were in place beginning with our founding fathers and throughout our short 234 year history have either faded into the background or have been totally abandoned by many of those in office today. The values of honesty, integrity, service for the sake of service, national pride and maybe most importantly the belief that the will of the people must prevail at all cost seems to be lost on our elected officials. Instead, our government and our leaders arrogantly operate with the belief that it is they who know what is best for our people and our nation. In spite of our values, our demands for honest, representative government, and in spite of the promises made during campaigns, we end up with elected officials voting in opposition to the overwhelming beliefs and desires of the people they represent. We have elected and appointed judges who overturn our votes on issues-from taxes, marriage, national security and even the very basic concept of protecting our own sovereignty. This while completely ignoring the Constitution and in many cases, common sense. In short, most Americans are fed up, disgusted and angry with our leaders and our government, stemming from the loss of core values and respect for the will of the people.

This brings us back to Tom Tancredo. Conversations about Tom begin with "I really like Tom Tancredo," or "he's the only one who has had the courage to stand up for our views on illegal immigration," or an array of other positive and complimentary statements. Our icon of liberty, the one representative we felt hadn't lost sight of our core values, suddenly did. It's really quite simple for a liberty type like me. What Tom has done has disrespected and circumvented the most important value that we have, the will of the people. At a point in the game when thousands of conservative Coloradoans, with over 35% of whom identify themselves as being affiliated with the Liberty Movement, and who have given their time, money, sweat and hearts by getting re-engaged in the system, they have been betrayed. After all these citizens decided to come out, many after years of complacency, to join in and say, "we will not allow you to take away our rights, we will not allow you to spend our grandchildren's future, to give away our sovereignty, and most importantly to ignore the will of the people. Tom did just that. In effect, what he did and when he did it said, "your nomination, your votes, all your work, your time and your passion were misguided and wrong. I'm going to make everything right by getting on this white horse and saving the day."

Nobody knows for sure why Tom Tancredo is doing what he's doing. Speculation and rumors around the water cooler run all the way from does he now need a job because of bad investments, or because of ego is he seeking a final moment in the sun, does he have some mysterious ingenious plan to actually propel the chosen candidate to victory, or is he now a clandestine insider who has suddenly decided to change sides? Is there a profit motive, a book deal, or is he simply delusional thinking he can actually win? One thing is for certain-he won't save the day. He will destroy any and all chances

of preventing another disastrous four years with Hickenlooper running Colorado. Tom Tancredo, like this nation, this state and all of us in the Liberty Movement are at a crossroads. Many of us feel we are slowing edging toward making the difference that can save and restore our nation from the path that is leading us to disaster.
